Spring Workshop announces final cycle of activities for *A Collective Present* (October–November 2017)

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### October

Spring Workshop is delighted to announce from October 14 onwards a special exhibition called *Sailing Through the Ha Bik Chuen Archive* created by art critic and curator **John Batten**.

The background of this exhibition at Spring starts in 2014 when we hosted a digitizing station for **Asia Art Archive** as they were making intensive efforts to care for **Ha Bik Chuen** (1925-2009)'s important archive. People visiting Spring found the items in Ha's archive to be a wonder: they came in and leafed through the various articles, magazines, documents for hours, marvelling at the insights Ha's collection revealed. Now AAA has placed the vast archive in a temporary home in Fo Tan that is open to the public for research.

Taking the opportunity to engage once again with Ha's archive, Spring asked Batten to dive into the archive and find treasures to display, including Ha's designs for Christmas cards (accompanied by the journal Ha kept of his thoughts on responses received), blueprints and the marquette for his large public sculpture that still stands in nearby Aberdeen, and Ha's now-infamous collage scrapbooks, all shown alongside memories of Wong Chuk Hang's printing factories.

### November

Spring's final exhibition, *A Collective Present*, will assemble the ongoing research of Tiffany Chung and Koki Tanaka, an outcome of their residencies at Spring. Curated by Curatorat-Large Christina Li, the pair of works concentrate on unpacking Hong Kong's recent history from the '60s to the present. As an extension of her ongoing research for the first part of *The Vietnam Exodus Project*, Chung will exhibit archival materials from local and international agencies that excavate personal histories and remap the now-erased spatial narratives of the local Vietnamese refugee community.

Continuing his research on the potential of temporary communities that arise in times of adversity, Tanaka's new work *Precarious Tasks #9: 24hrs Gathering (Timeline)* invited eight participants to Spring to jointly compose a possible

timeline of Hong Kong's social movements starting from the '60s in a 24-hour session in August. The resulting documentation interweaves their personal stories with a timeline of significant events in Hong Kong history. On show will be threads extracted by Tanaka from the session which (re)imagines a collective memory and narrative of the city.

As a moment of reflection and transformation, *A Collective Present* puts on public view two overlapping temporalities to give an account of Hong Kong's otherwise disappearing and overlooked past. As Spring moves toward its planned hiatus that begins at the end of this year, Chung and Tanaka's manifestations on humanity offer insights on how we might be able to situate ourselves as individuals and as a society in these tumultuous times.

### ABOUT JOHN BATTEN

John Batten is an active member of Hong Kong's art community as an art critic, curator and public commentator on art, culture, heritage and urban planning issues. He is a regular contributor to the South China Morning Post, Ming Pao Weekly and on television and radio. He is Organiser of the annual charity art event, Hong Kong ArtWalk, Convenor of the Heritage and Urban Planning Advocacy Group, the Central & Western Concern Group and President of the International Association of Art Critics-Hong Kong.

### ABOUT TIFFANY CHUNG

Tiffany Chung is internationally noted for her exquisite cartographic drawings and installations that examine conflict, migration, displacement, urban progress and transformation in relation to history and cultural memory. Her ongoing comparative study of forced migration through the current Syrian humanitarian crisis and the post-1975 Vietnamese mass exodus unpacks asylum policies and refugee experiences, providing insights into the constant shifts in international asylum policy making.

### ABOUT KOKI TANAKA

Koki Tanaka (b. 1975) born in Tochigi, lives and works in Kyoto, Japan. His works have been exhibited worldwide at venues including the Hammer Museum, Los Angeles; Van Abbemuseum, Eindhoven; ICA, London; Skulpturen Projekte Münster 2017; Liverpool Biennale 2016, Taipei Biennale 2006, the Gwangju Biennale 2008. He achieved greater prominence in Europe following his exhibition at the Japanese pavilion and its special mention at the 55th Venice Biennale. In 2015 he was named Artist of the Year by Deutsche Bank.
